I'm Writing a Story!

After you read *Help! We Need a Title!* by Herve Tullet, ask your student what things are necessary for a story. Based on this book, you can emphasize these six story parts: author, title, characters, setting, conflict (the problem), resolution (the solution to the problem).

Discuss these with your student.

If your student is interested, encourage her to complete the brainstorming activity on the next page. (She can type on the page, if she prefers.)

Can she generate ideas for a story?

She can put her own name on the author slot—giving her ownership and producing pride.

The other five boxes can be completed in any order.

1. Setting

Where will her story begin?

2. Characters

Who is starring in this tale?

3. Title

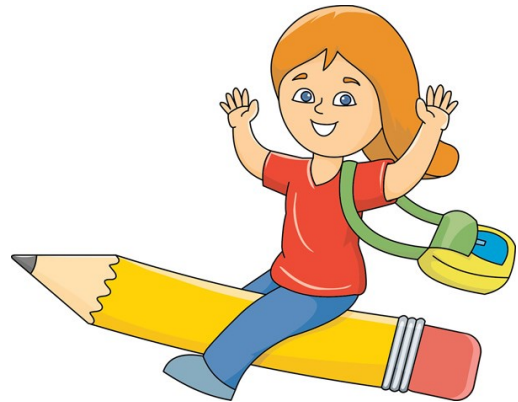
What will she name this adventure?

4. Conflict

What problems will develop? What dilemmas will the characters overcome?

5. Resolution

How will the problems be solved?



When your student is finished, she may or may not want to use her brainstorming page to write a story. Maybe she will want to complete another brainstorming page. Please give her options. Make sure she believes she has choices because she *is* the author.

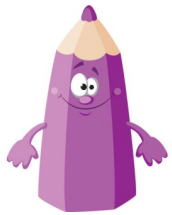
